

Message from the PRESIDENT/CEO

As we complete year eleven at Auburn Valley Humane Society, it seems like it was yesterday when dozens of dedicated volunteers, three employees, and I performed all the daily duties at the animal shelter. As I look back at all the challenges and triumphs of the past eleven years, I am reminded of the real reasons Auburn Valley Humane Society continues to change lives four paws at a time and why our organization is very successful at what we do.

2023 was again, a year of growth and progress for our organization. This last year was a time of commitment and determination of our staff and dedicated volunteers to ensure our organization's continued success. We have grown stronger as an organization, strengthening our philosophies, beliefs, and practices, reaffirming our mission and our unwavering dedication to the citizens and animals in the communities we serve. We are very excited to look forward to our future in animal welfare.

As 2023 ended, the dream of having a first-rate local animal sheltering facility eleven years ago has become more than a reality, we have become an enterprise with 60 employees and hundreds of volunteers supporting our efforts. This past year, we revisited our mission and vision statements and reaffirmed our core values. As an organization, we review our policies, procedures, and always look to increase the quality of care for the homeless and abandoned animals in the shelter and the programs we provide to the community.

During this year of continued growth, I am proud of our organization's accomplishments. We are ever evolving and always seeking ways to pivot our efforts and continue ways to fulfill our vision and mission. Our dedicated staff and volunteers continued the hard work of fostering, caring, adopting homeless pets, and the humane education of children and adults throughout our community. Partnerships with local businesses continued to flourish. The strength of relationships AVHS had built with the City of Auburn, the local veterinary community, and King and Pierce Counties' citizens enabled us to grow stronger over the past year. Our donors' and supporters' generosity and concern for our efforts were critical in achieving our goals. Many of the challenges we face in a post-pandemic world did not impact our fundraising efforts that so vitally assist us financially to support the animals in our care. Auburn Valley Humane Society Thrift Store & More also continued to thrive. Again, due to the thrift store's 2023 success, we continue to grow our Humane Services programs and fund these vital and much-needed services. The continued growth of our merged partner, Northwest Spay & Neuter Center, has allowed us to expand much needed low-cost S/N and Wellness services to the region in record breaking numbers. This past December, AVHS through NWSNC also launched a much-needed, low-cost dentistry program for the pets in our region. A lease was recently signed with the Outlet Collection in Auburn and construction has begun on the AVHS Cat Café anticipating opening in first quarter 2024. This new endeavour will broaden our exposure in the region, as well as increase our adoption capacity for cats and generate funds to further our mission.

One of our primary goals is to find lasting, loving homes for the companion animals that pass through our doors at the shelter. In 2023, 636 dogs, 1079 cats, and 57 other animals were owner relinquished, transferred from other shelters, or found as lost animals and taken into our care. We gave them loving care, certified their health, administered all necessary vaccinations, microchipped them, evaluated their temperaments, and then spayed or neutered them. Many homeless or abandoned animals received necessary dental or extraordinary medical care. Once accepted into our shelter, there is no time limit on the animal's stay with us.

In 2023, the shelter placed 1,276 pets into adoptive homes, and we reunited 191 lost pets with their owners. We also transferred

85 homeless pets to local rescue organizations. Because euthanasia is never our first choice, we are proud to report that our 2022 live release rate was 97%. AVHS reunited 36% of lost dogs and 3% of lost cats with their owners. All adopted animals left our shelter spayed or neutered, vaccinated, and microchipped. At the shelter, Auburn Valley Humane Society spayed or neutered 1,034 shelter animals and 167 public animals owned by incomequalified King and Pierce



County residents through our SPOT program. In 2023, the Wellness program Northwest Spay & Neuter Center and performed 2,480 wellness exams for the pets of income-qualified residents in our community. NWSNC also performed spay or neuter surgeries on 3,068 non-profit partner animals and 11,404 public dogs and cats for a total of 14,471 animals and gave 19,945 vaccinations. In 2023, through all of our programs, Auburn Valley Humane Society impacted the lives of 23,168 animals in our region.

We are not only an animal shelter, adoption agency, a spay and neuter clinic, a thrift store or a cat café, AVHS is also an educational organization. Community outreach is a vital part of our organization. Over 508 active volunteers spent 23,359 hours at our offsite adoption sites, cleaning kennels and cages, caring for 477 dogs and cats in foster care, doing laundry and dishes, constructing enrichment toys for the animals in our care, walking dogs, helping with customer service, at the thrift store and fundraising and the setup of the cat cafe. Thanks to our dedicated volunteers and staff, we can inform the world of our progress through our websites, and AVHS social media pages.

Over the past year, our Board of Directors has grown and given valued direction and support. We have diversified and maintained our revenue stream and successfully navigated our expenditures. We also grew our important animal-related/human service programs. The Public Veterinary Assistance and the Pets in Crisis funds assisted the owners of 53 animals with emergency medical care and boarding needs. The Pets for Life program provided support for 556 animals. 124 pets of 37 owners in need were assisted monthly through the AVHS Shelter Pet Pantry program. At Northwest Spay & Neuter Center, the pet pantry provided 5,882 pounds of food to pets in need. Due to the success of the Shelter Buddies Reading Program, 68 children spent their time reading to our cats in feline adoption. The Girl Scout Badge program saw 70 Girl Scouts received their AVHS patch in 2023. We continued a memorandum of understanding with King County and DAWN to house the pets of domestic violence victims in our community. We partnered with Seattle Humane Society for the Pets of Seniors Food Bank, which also continues to grow.

Acknowledgment for these many successes again goes to our dedicated staff and volunteers, the support of the City of Auburn and neighbouring animal sheltering agencies, and the generous devotion of the King and Pierce Counties' citizens. Most importantly, our successes are a direct result of our faithful donors and supporters. Once again, as in the past eleven years, we have ended 2023 as an essential and vital part of our community. We are thankful and proud of our 2023 accomplishments and look forward to significant growth again in 2024. We could not have done it without your help, and we are honoured to be here among you still, continuing our mission and changing lives... four paws at a time!







ANIMAL INTAKES

ANIMAL OUTCOMES

Auburn Valley Humane Society strives to find a loving family for every adoptable animal. The outcomes include animals that were adopted, transferred to rescue groups, reunited with their owners, died in shelter, DOA (dead on arrival), euthanasia medical/ behavior and owner requested euthanasia.

AVHS does not euthanize animals for time limits, space or age of the animal. AVHS utilizes every resource possible to find forever homes for the animals in our care.

MAPLE



Maple, a 3-year-old female medium-breed dog, came into the shelter as a stray with some health concerns. Maple had sores and extensive wounds on face, shoulder, and neck . We don't know much about her life outside of AVHS. The staff had to staple up many old wounds. She required extensive care as she had staples to contain a shoulder wound. A foster home would provide her with more comfort than being at the shelter.

She was spayed and her incredible new family was more than willing to provide her with the lifelong care and support she needed. She needs time to heal! She was adopted in early December.



MEDICAL STAFF AT WORK

In 2023, Auburn Valley Humane Society medical and animal care staff provide quality, loving care to every animal who comes into our shelter. The animals in our care receive physical exams, vaccinations, spay/neuter services, microchips and in some cases, extensive medical and dental care prior to adoption to a loving family.

STILETTO



Stiletto came to AVHS as a transfer from another shelter that needed help with surgery. She needed an amputation and medical treatment for chronic diarrhea/ gastrointestinal disease. She was 1 years old and needed medical care and love to heal. She had extensive diagnostics for her health condition, including blood and fecal tests, intestinal biopsies and many options for her inflammatory bowel disease. She is healthy and healed. She was adopted 5 months later after much foster care and love.

Buddy, formerly Draxx, arrived at the AVHS Animal Shelter as a puppy and has lived with several families over the years. He was rescued just in time. His foster family gave him extraordinary care and worked on consistent training to prepare him for a new second chance home. They were not going to give up on Buddy!

He was adopted and doing very well. He was a trim 80 lbs. due to the running that he does. His new family loves him. Thanks to donors like you who gave our vulnerable animals a healthy start and helped to save more lives this season. They all deserve care and love.







ANIMAL WELFARE STAFF AT WORK

One of the ways we measure our success is by how long a cat or dog is in the shelter before they are adopted. The smaller the number, the sooner they go to a new home and the more animals can come to us for lifesaving care. Moving animals through the shelter faster reduces stress and illness.

He's the one on the left in the photo where he's sitting on the other dog and he's on the right where they have matching sweaters (Hopper has floppy ears).

PUBLIC VETERINARY ASSISTANCE FUND

At Auburn Valley Humane Society, we recognize the importance of the human-pet bond. We are willing to work with the family to assist with various pet needs when a family is experiencing housing insecurity, job loss, or medical issues. This is Scoobie (12 years, black and white) and Spike (4 years, red). Scoobie was in desperate need of a dental cleaning and Spike had an abnormal growth on his side that needed removed. By utilizing our Public Veterinary Assistance Fund, we were able to cover the cost of treatment for both dogs!

Their owner, Mike, had to say: "We want to thank you and the foundation a million for helping us out with these issues. Everything went flawless thanks to you."







PET LICENSING

AVHS is contracted to be the service provider for pet licensing for the City of Auburn.

Why license my pet?

- Licensing your Pet is the law.
- All dogs and cats over 8 weeks of age that reside in the City of Auburn require a pet license.
- Pets without a license are subject to fines and penalties.
- Having a pet license quickly reunites a lost pet with their owner.
- Funds received through pet licensing benefit the animals in the City's care at AVHS.



Scrabble arrived at the AVHS Animal Shelter needing medical help! Scrabble was a fivemonth-old small mixed-breed dog with neurological issues and stunted growth. Our skilled veterinarian and medical staff completed numerous x-rays, blood tests, and neurological consultation to determine the best pathway for the puppy. He was exposed to parvovirus and survived. He developed a spinal infection and had multiple fractures/breaks in his neck. Quickly given medical treatment and lots of care resulted in a positive outcome. Today, adopted, he is living the best life ever.

Meadow arrived at the Auburn Valley Humane Society in mid-summer. She was about 8 months old, with a lame leg that could be painful as she can not bear weight on it. She would have extensive tests and treatment with radiology, restrictive activity, and an orthopedic consultation. She had a fracture repair to her right hip and would need 8 weeks to heal. Due to the customers at the thrift store, the extraordinary medical fund was used to pay for the surgery.

MURPHY & GINN

Ginn and Murphy, two orange male cats – had ringworm when they arrived at the shelter. The treatment takes lots of time with oral medication, baths and lots of care. They were fostered during the treatment. When they were available to adopt, they went together.

NWSNC Dentistry Services

Dentistry Services started in December. A pre-dental exam allows NWSNC staff to examine the pet and discuss dental procedures, do bloodwork and provide an estimate for services. Once the exam is completed, the pet is scheduled for the next available dental procedure. Basic cleanings start at \$355. Procedures with extractions range from \$599-\$1499.
